The Collaboration Between the ICAA, INTBAU, and the Prince's Foundation

In 2020, the <u>ICAA</u>, <u>INTBAU</u>, and the <u>Prince's Foundation</u> were pleased to present a collaborative series of high-level online talks on 'The Architecture of Place,' a series that brought together the established and emerging voices working to create a better built future. Running from October through December 2020, this series of seven lectures and discussions was hosted via Zoom and introduced by Michael Lykoudis, Dean Emeritus of the University of Notre Dame School of Architecture.







## The Architecture of Place: Design by Radical Indigenism, with Julia Watson



In this talk hosted on December 15, 2020, Julia Watson discussed her research into thousands of years of human wisdom and ingenuity from places like Peru, the Philippines, Tanzania, Kenya, Iran, Iraq, India, and Indonesia. She spoke on how we can rediscover an ancient mythology in a contemporary context, radicalizing the spirit of human nature.


This program, originally held on December 8, 2020, focused on current topics in climate-responsive design. Design that works with, rather than against, its local climate is

This program, originally held on November 24, 2020, focused on issues of rapid urbanisation. The world's urban population is projected to almost double over the next fifty years, and if current settlement trends persist, this would mean a tripling of the urban land mass. Half of that growth is projected in secondary cities and across Commonwealth Countries, with much of it likely to be unplanned.


The Architecture of Place: American Housing & Social Justice, with Marianne Cusato



The course, hosted by Marianne Cusato, looks at the history and lasting legacy of housing segregation in America, intended and unintended. Beyond the past and present, it includes a discussion of potential ideas for addressing these inequities, specifically the nationwide affordable housing crisis, so we might build a stronger future for all communities.

It is difficult to find a country in the world not currently facing a housing crisis. The scale, scope, and nature of the challenge varies from place to place. There is, however, one fundamental reality across the globe: we need to provide more homes; and we need to find the ways to do this that benefit communities without harming the environment.

Our urban areas are expected to grow one and a half times by 2045, to over six billion city dwellers - with developed land projected to triple. This talk explores the intersection between health and urbanisation, and what it means for how we plan and manage our cities.

The Architecture of Place: Florida, Atlanta, and Al Ain



This lecture focuses on local forces that influence design, like climate, or the skills of the labor force, or the proximity of materials, or local culture; and larger forces--regional, national, and global--that are in constant tension with local forces. Among the questions explored is one that many of us face, which is whether we have the right—or the professional standing—to work in far-flung places that we don't know as well as we know our own backyards.






