Historic Brickwork: A Design Resource

A vast proportion of classical and traditional architecture is constructed of brick, one of the oldest and most enduring of building materials. Brick bonds and details lend character and interest to buildings. Yet many architects overlook the value of brickwork as a design resource, too often relying on mechanical veneers. Using many illustrations, this course examines different brickwork styles found on American buildings from the colonial period into the twentieth century. The discussion will include European origins, regional styles, brick manufacturing, mortar joint types, as well as decorative details.

Palladio's Book IV: Four and a Half Centuries of Inspiration



Andrea Palladio's The Four Book on Architecture is unquestionably the most influential architectural treatise ever written. The treatise's Book IV consists of Palladio's illustrations and descriptions of twenty-five Roman temples. From his study of their ruins Palladio produced ninety-seven pages of elevations, sections, plans, and details depicting his concepts of the temples' original appearance. His lavish plates offered for the first time a credible vision of the grandeur and beauty of ancient Roman design. Book IV's seductive images have served as a primary design source for many great classical works henceforth. This video lecture offers a glimpse of the riches of Book IV and presents numerous examples of structures that drew inspiration from Palladio's plates. A primary intent of this presentation is to encourage current practitioners to mine Book IV's many resources for enriching contemporary classicism.

Specimens for the Architectural Lectures: Jefferson's Classical Orders at the University of Virginia

"Specimens for the Architectural Lectures" is how Thomas Jefferson described the intent of his use of different versions of the classical orders for his design of the University of Virginia. Not only did his scheme result in a visually striking complex, it formed a unique medium for imparting architectural knowledge to its students. Even 200 years later Jefferson's "Academical Village" continues to be an effective means for teaching both basics and nuances of the classical language. To this end, Calder Loth's video lecture offers insights on each of the complex's orders and relates them to the published sources Jefferson used for reference. Included in the presentation are the ancient structures from which the orders and their details were derived. Also revealed are some of our architect-president's personal touches to the orders.

With their riches, the princes built large villas with elaborate gardens just outside Florence. Medici, Castello, and Petraia are a few of the early country estates built in the 15th and 16th centuries. Four hundred years later, most villas remained, although in need of repair. New money arrived in the Tuscan hills as expatriate Englishmen busied themselves renewing and creating magnificent gardens such as Gamberaia, La Pietra, I Tatti, and Le Balze. Learn the history of Renaissance garden making and how it was interpreted by English gardeners of the early 20th century.

Edith Wharton & Her New York with Francis Morrone

Edith Wharton is well known among architects and designers for her first book, *The Decoration of Houses*, an enormously influential tract on interior design published in 1897. She was also, of course, one of America's greatest novelists, and 2020 marked the one hundredth anniversary of her best-known novel, *The Age of Innocence*. In this lavishly illustrated talk we will explore the native Manhattanite's home town from the time of her birth at 14 West 23rd Street in 1862 to her departure for France at the turn of the century, and the world of *The Age of Innocence*, set among New York's insular upper class in the 1870s, a time of profound change in America, in New York, and in what constituted "society." Not least, we will examine the intellectual and literary foundations of the American Renaissance in architecture and art.


